Christians, Muslims and Jews believe that we need to say sorry to God when we do something wrong.



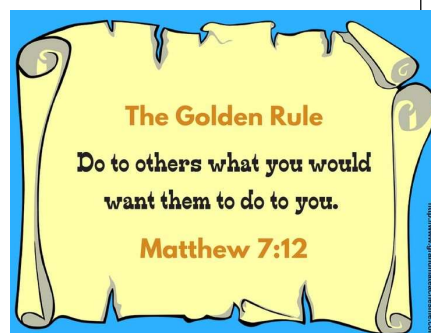
The world is not always a good place. People of faith try to follow the rules and traditions of their faith.

The Two Commandments of Jesus are "Love God, Love People".

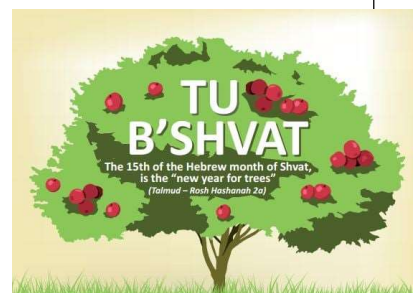
The Golden Rule is found in the Bible but is also important in other traditions and faiths, including Humanism.

Tu B'Shvat is the Jewish festival for trees. This is an awareness day for looking after the world. Trees are planted.

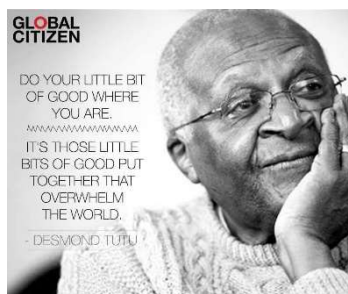

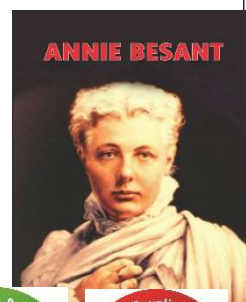


Zakah is the third pillar of Islam. Muslims give money (alms) to charity.
