What do I already know?

The Sermon on the Mount:

Jesus uses this sermon as a way of reminding people how to live their lives.

The Two Commandments of Jesus are "Love God, Love People".

The Golden Rule is found in the Bible but is also important in other Traditions and faiths, including Humanism.

The Golden Rule

"Do unto others what you would have them do unto you" *Christianity*

"You should desire for others what you desire for yourself" *Islam*

"Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself" *Judaism*

"Do naught unto others what you would not have them do unto you" *Hinduism*

Christianity:

Christians believe that God was made in His own image.



The fall of Adam and Eve is a significant event for Christians and reminds them that they need to seek forgiveness for sins through prayer and actions.

Humanists are a group of non-religious people. They believe that you should work out your own way of being good without the need to worship a God or "divine being".

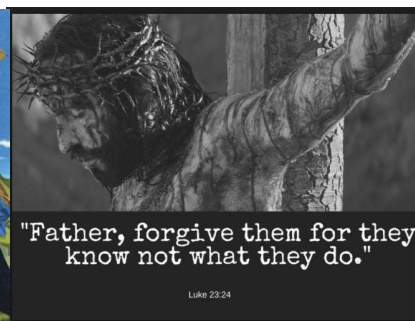
HUMANISM

in a nutshell

1. Putting **human beings** and other **living things** at the centre of your moral outlook
2. Seeing the world as a **natural place** and looking to **science** and **reason** to make sense of it
3. Promoting and supporting human **flourishing** across all frontiers, and championing **human rights** for everyone

Key Vocabulary	Definition
authority	a person or group who has the right to give orders
commandment	an order or direct instruction
deeds	actions and behaviours
divine being	something that is bigger than everything – a god, usually
flourishing	to do well and succeed
metaphor	a phrase that compares to something else
naught	nothing
value	an idea that is considered most important

Jesus' two commandments are lived out in the parable of the Good Samaritan and in his words when he was on the cross.



Jesus called actions "fruit". This was a metaphor for how our actions impact on the world.

Humanists and Christians share values about the world but their beliefs are different.
